USI (Unique Student Identifier) information

Anyone undertaking any education and training with a provider outside the school system must have a USI.

This applies to:

- Vocational Education and Training eg: study at Certificate or Diploma level through TAFE or other Registered Training Organisation (RTO's)
- Higher Education eg: Degrees etc. through universities and other providers

The Australian Government describes this as being a bit like a "Medicare number for education" and without one you cannot receive your qualification or get any sort of Commonwealth financial assistance.

This USI allows you to login to your training account and see all your VET training records and the results of all your courses. You can also print out all your results to take to an employer when you are applying for a job or to any training provider when you are doing any additional courses. You must have this Unique Student Identifier before you can commence any courses. If you don't already have one, you can create one at www.usi.gov.au

Careers in Sustainability

What are Sustainability Engineering Careers? Sustainability engineers tackle problems like climate change, population growth, and access to clean drinking water. Careers in sustainability engineering are about improving or creating things to lower our environmental impact and finding more sustainable ways to keep doing the things we're used to. There are opportunities in water management, renewable power, biofuel development, electric vehicle manufacturing and more - it's a very diverse field, and it's in the top 25 emerging occupations in Australia (NSC, 2021). What skills and strengths are needed? Sustainability engineers need solid STEM skills and well-developed enterprise and employability skills such as problem-solving, communication, time management, curiosity, good use of ICT, and teamwork. What are the pathways? To develop the skills above, choose school subjects such as English, Maths (advanced if possible), physics and/or chemistry.





Have you thought about a career in Hospitality and Tourism?

As hotels, restaurants and travel services have become more sophisticated, traditional Australian attitudes to 'serving' have changed dramatically. In the past, most people in the tourism, hospitality and related industries had little training, with most gaining the relevant knowledge and skills on the job. These days, both vocational and higher education qualifications at various levels are offered by a range of institutions.

While TAFE institutes and private providers were the first to offer courses in this field, universities have followed suit, especially those in regions known for their tourism industry.

Private institutions and TAFE institutes do well in this field, probably because many are good at teaching students 'how to' and not just 'about' work in tourism and hospitality. A number are residential schools where students work on the premises as part of their course. Note that fees may seem high at some of these providers, but they usually include accommodation and meals. Make an enquiry to be sure.

Career opportunities in Tourism and Hospitality field

A range of occupations is possible after study in this field, including caterer, chef or cook, events coordinator, hospitality manager, resort manager, tour guide, travel salesperson and visitor information officer.

Specific occupations that have high projected growth rates in employment are those of a more operational nature, such as cooks, waiters, bar attendants, room attendants and kitchen hands.

Year 12 checklist for applying through UAC ☐ Research available courses There are over 2,000 courses available for 2024 admissions via UAC.

You can read descriptions of these courses on the UAC website: check the admission requirements and ATAR information. Once you've found your favourite courses, research pathways and alternatives so that you have a back-up plan. Take note of important dates in the application process.
□ Get your USI Your Unique Student Identifier is your government issued student reference numbe that you will keep with you for life. You need it to enrol at an institution and receive Commonwealth financial assistance, including HECS-HELP and FEE-HELP. You may already have one if you've undertaken vocational education or training. You can create a USI – or check if you have one – at usi.gov.au.

Keep your UAC PIN safe You need your UAC Personal Identification Number to:

- apply for tertiary study through UAC
- access your ATAR. If you're a 2023 NSW HSC/ACT Senior Secondary Certificate student, your four-digit UAC PIN was emailed in April to the address you registered with NESA or the ACT BSSS. Note that your UAC PIN is different to your NESA PIN. For all other applicants, your UAC PIN is the first four digits of your date of birth; for example, if your birthday is 17 May, your UAC PIN is 1705. To protect your privacy, it's a good idea to change your UAC PIN once you've submitted your application. And, of course, keep your UAC PIN in a secure place. For more information, visit uac.edu.au/pin.

Apply for uni through UAC. Go to UAC's website to apply. You can select up to five course preferences. Even if you're not sure what you want to study, apply now and change your preferences later. We recommend you apply before 11.59pm on 29 September 2023 to avoid an increase in the processing charge. Remember to make a note of your application number. You'll need this number and your UAC PIN to log back in to your application to change your preferences.

Provide a current email address You'll need to provide a current email address when you apply so that UAC can let you know about the progress of your application. We recommend you log in regularly to check for messages.

Check your details are correct. Personal details you provided to NESA/ACT BSSS – including your first, middle and last name and your date of birth – will be automatically entered in your UAC application. If they don't match your official ID (eg your passport or birth certificate) contact UAC. All details must match when you enrol at uni.

Apply for schemes and scholarships Schools Recommendation Scheme.

The Schools Recommendation Scheme (SRS) gives you an opportunity to receive an early offer by being assessed on criteria other than, or in addition to, the ATAR. These criteria include school recommendations and senior secondary studies. SRS applications close at midnight on 18 September 2023. After this date, you cannot access or modify your SRS application. For details, go to uac.edu.au/srs.

The Educational Access Scheme (EAS) can help you gain admission to tertiary study if you've experienced educational disadvantage. Apply for EAS as part of your application for uni. We recommend you apply by 23 November 2023 so that you can be assessed in time for the main Year 12 offer rounds. For details, go to uac.edu.au/eas.

Equity Scholarships Equity Scholarships help the most financially disadvantaged students with the costs associated with higher education. We recommend you apply by 8 December 2023.

Bachelor of Paramedicine - Charles Sturt

There will be a number of units of tertiary study to complete a Bachelor of Paramedicine degree, some of which will be delivered online. NSW Ambulance will assist you achieve these outcomes by providing work-based clinical experience and mentorship as well as scheduling your attendance at required intensive (face to face) courses. Some face to face learning will be paid, where it is required by NSW Ambulance in lieu of on road rostered shifts. You will be responsible for any costs incurred to complete your degree through your university. This includes but is not limited to, Higher Education Contribution Scheme (HECS), enrolment fees, student union fees, or any course incidentals and materials.

You must enter a program and gain the award of a Bachelor of Paramedicine, or equivalent, and be able to gain registration (see link to Board Standards for Registration) as a Paramedic with the Paramedicine Board of Australia. Once this is achieved, NSW Ambulance will offer you a permanent full time position subject to a satisfactory conduct and services check. Essential Requirements for University Admission

You must meet the following criteria to be eligible to apply for the Tertiary Qualified Post Employment Registered Paramedic Pathway.

- Completed High School Certificate with an ATAR of 75 or higher (including adjustment factors) or equivalent.
 OR
- Successful completion of two or more university level subjects (AQF level Associate Degree or higher) demonstrating a reasonable prospect of success through the Grade Point Average (GPA) gained in these studies.
 OR
- A completed AQF Certificate IV or higher level qualification.
 OR
- A completed Tertiary Preparation Course from an Australian University or an accredited provider demonstrating a reasonable prospect of success through the Grade Point Average (GPA) gained in these studies OR
- Completed a course at university Diploma level or higher at any Australian higher education provider (or an equivalent overseas qualification)

If you are initially successful in this pathway, you will be given further information regarding University admission.

If you do not gain and maintain University admission and ongoing enrolment, your employment will not continue.

If you do not meet expected academic progression across each semester, your employment with NSW Ambulance may be reviewed.
